Welcome to the Feast of St. Joseph¹

Our journey began with a simple phone call: "Circe, your mother told me you were going to be Poggioreale for the St. Joseph's Altar in March. Guess what? We're going to be there, too," Vancie said. And so it was that three generations of Sicilian Texans, all related to one another, ended up traveling together last March to Poggioreale, a small hill town in Western Sicily where our parents, grandparents and great-grandparents originated. My husband, daughter, and I were there at the invitation of the commune (town) to screen an ethnographic film we had made several years ago. Texas Tavola: A Taste of Sicily in the Lone Star State traces the migration of food, religion, and identity from Sicily to Texas, with a focus on the elaborate rituals associated with the Tavola di San Giuseppe (or St. Joseph's altar). The altar of the film, the same one we celebrate today, is a complex expression of religious devotion and folk creativity, a holy banquet to feed the poor, and a Lenten feast to celebrate our blessings for a crowd that can swell into the hundreds in Sicily and Texas alike. Bringing the film to Sicily was a long-awaited opportunity to share our version of the tradition with our Sicilian kinfolk. With Italian subtitles in place and the film now accessible to an Italian audience, we wondered if Sicilians would recognize Sicilian-Americans and our versions of these traditions as their own? If they would get past the Texas accents to care about distant relatives they had never met? That's what we had come here to find out. And quite by accident, the same group us that had appeared in Texas Tavola-Vancie Todaro and her sister, Angelina, Vancie's daughter, Graceanna, her son, Ross Todaro Jr., and his wife, Geneva, my daughter, Miranda Sofia Lewis, husband, Randolph Lewis and myselfwere all converging on our ancestral home at the same time. This was the first of many miraculous coincidences that had us thinking that St. Joseph's had a hand in bringing us together.

We had a powerful screening in Poggioreale—for us as a family, as Catholics with a special devotion to St. Joseph, as descendants of Poggiorealese, as filmmakers and, I think, for our audience. What we had done was relatively simple: we had recorded the ancient rituals of a small town thriving in a faraway place. But for this small act of attention to the improbable flow of culture, the community of Poggioreale was effusively grateful, presenting us bouquets of flowers, equally florid speeches, and a generous luncheon with the Mayor and his administration. The mayor spoke, the deputy mayor spoke, even the "baby mayor" spoke with impressive authority (he is a 12 year old who wears a Italian tri-color sash to indicate his official role as a junior politician). The Sicilians marveled that Texans still constructed altars in the old ways. The Vice Mayor singled out Vancie and Angelina for their devotion to St. Joseph and for their hard work in carrying on the beautiful tradition of our forefathers. One bystander said what was happening in Texas was "like something from Sicily 200 years ago." Old people cried and shook our hands like we had found a long lost relative, which, in a modest sense, we had.

We experienced many beautiful interactions during our stay. One of the most moving was when an elderly man began to recite a verse in honor of St. Joseph before the main community altar beneath the Church. In a stunning coincidence, that we agreed was surely the work of St. Joseph yet again, the poet's daughters, Vancie and Angelina, were standing in the same room. Visiting from Texas, these sisters were experiencing the Tavola in the town where their father, John Palasota, was born and raised and continued to be a local literary hero. Having lived their whole life in Bryan, Texas, Vancie and Angelina still pray in Sicilian in the mannertheir father taught them to do and lead altars that have fed more than 800 people. Now, in the basement of a small church, theywere crying and embracing a man who knew their father in the 1940s and still remembered his powerful poem to St. Joseph. They also found their father's poem hanging on the wall next to the altar and learned that his poetry was displayed proudly in the local museum. Meanwhile, small children milled about, curious about the treats. Rosalinda Fazzino, a sweet young woman who works in the Mayor's officeinvited us to her mother's altar, proud that her family had created a vast display of bread and flowers along with a meal for 100 people. At another altar, done in the traditional style from many years ago, a 95-year-old woman in a black dress walked over and joined us in conversation—she was as lucid and able as anyone in the room. She, too, remembered Vancie and Angelina's father, as did the former Mayor, Mr. Maniscalco, who later invited Vancie and Angelina to his home to share documents and stories about their father that he had gathered. This fusion of religion, nation, art, and family waspowerful and we all felt moved by the experience. Something unusual was happening, the full import of which we did not yet fully understand.

The following day was just as extraordinary. Everyone toured the altars that were built in the town hall, the church, and private houses. Older people were obvious enthusiasts, but so were children and teenagers, who approached the tradition with a remarkable degree of respect and enthusiasm. For all of us, there was a sense of mutual recognition that the St. Joseph Altar was "our thing" as a community, as a people, whether we were raised in Texas or Sicily. This special devotion to St. Joseph, this focus on faith, family and feasting, shaped all of us. Just as it is in Texas, at the culmination of the feast day in Poggioreale, when we gathered to eat at Rosalinda's house, the altar was broken apart in a joyous feeding frenzy of cake, bread, and cookies, not to mention the vast piles of pasta, beans and vegetables that had already been served from steaming cauldrons. We were reminded not to thank the hosts for food as it was handed to us. Doing so takes away from the real host: St. Joseph.

That night we walked in a three-hour procession through the streets of this rural village, 500 souls walking in an ancient ritual through the modernism of the new town. Movingly, the prayers that were sung to St. Joseph during the procession were the exact same ones that we sing during the rosary in Texas. The Sicilian women and men who were walking next to their Texas cousins immediately recognized that we knew the words and were delighted, nodding their heads at us with a smile. This sense of mutual connection grew so strong that at one point the local men who were

members of the St. Joseph Altar Society honored their Texas *cugino*, Ross TodaroJr., by inviting him to help them pull the enormous wooden platform that held the illuminated statue of St. Joseph. The Sicilians told us that Sicilian Texans are possibly more religious, but we all experiencedthe same sense of devotion, fervor and intensity as we walked through the dark streets, passing town elders who stood in the windows, watching in silence, stopping the procession from time to time to bless the local infirm. We walked together late into the night, not getting a chance to eat until almost midnight. Even then we were still going: the charming young waiter at the local Pizzeria asked to sit with us, curious about Texas Sicilians and their altars.

What we learned on our tip to Sicily was that we were part of something much bigger than ourselves—we are connected to a very specific community and its' unique religious and cultural history, and our special tradition of honoring St Joseph reflects not only our devotion to the Saint, but also how we as Sicilian and Sicilian-American people exude faith, hope, kindness, and endurance in the face of the absurdities and joys of life. St. Joseph blessed our trip and brought us together for a reason, so that we could carry the message of our experience in Poggioreale back to all of you, and so that we could inspire future generations to continue this tradition that makes us who we are. This altar is a both and offering and a blessing, the work of many generations in an extended family to inspire us all to continue to honor our past while looking to the future. Enjoy!

History of the Saint Joseph Altar

The celebration of the St. Joseph's Altars on or near March 19 dates back to the 16th century. It is an ancient Sicilian/Italian tradition that immigrants from Southern Italy brought to the United States. To this day, it is still one of their more celebrated Church holidays. Reasons vary for this devotion. Some to fulfill a promise, some to give thanks for a favor granted, such as the safe return of a loved one from the war, some for healing the sick, for a happy family or for success in studies or business. This tradition is about faith, feasting and family, the three values at the heart of the Sicilian way of life. This feast comes two days after the feast of St. Patrick and is a feast in both senses of the word: it is a religious celebration that consists of a rosary in Italian as well as a Mass. It is also a banquet with an abundance of food and decorative ethnic desserts, and provides an opportunity for the people to share.

Legend has it that the first table was offered when prayers to St. Joseph resulted in the end of a period of drought and famine. Their prayers were answered with much needed rain. The harvest of their staple crop, the fava bean, was abundant and the farmers, in thanksgiving constructed a three tiered altar representing the Holy Trinity, draped it white and adorned it with flowers and laid upon it their finest grain, fruits, vegetables, seafood and wine. The poor were invited to share in the prayers and festivities. St. Joseph has been revered as the patron of carpenters, widows, unwed mothers and orphans. He is also considered the protector of Sicilians and the guardian of poor people.

The first generation of Sicilians instructed their children to continue giving tables as a duty of faith and a way to thank St. Joseph for their prosperity. The tradition was continued in the United States beginning in 1910 and the 1920's in the Italian sections of areas where they had settled after coming to America. Most of the Sicilians coming to America were poor and brought with them some clothing, very little money and a fava bean for good luck.

Families desiring to honor St. Joseph will get together with family and friends weeks ahead of time of the feast day to begin cooking and preparing the traditional foods. Many hours are spent shaping and designing the elaborate cookies, which decorate the altar. Quite a number of these items are symbolic. These foods consist of large golden bread loaves, (cuccidatti) formed in the shapes of wreaths, representing the crown of thorns, hearts symbolizing the Sacred Heart of Jesus and Mary, the Cross, representing the crucifixion, the Chalice for water and wine, a Monstrance containing the Host, St. Joseph's staff, palms representing those strewn in Jesus' path, fig-filled cookies elaborately decorated, cookies (biscotti) in various colors and flavored with almonds, lemon, anise, and other spices, aneli (small rings), pastry kernels (pignolatti) molded with caramelized sugar into pyramids

representing the pine cones Jesus played with as a child. On the feast day, a Italian spaghetti dinner is served to all the guests who are in attendance. Since this holiday usually falls during Lent, there is no meat served. Pasta e sugo (spaghetti with sauce) with grated toasted bread crumbs (mudica) representing the sawdust for St. Joseph the Carpenter, and hard boiled eggs (suggesting new life.) Pupa cu l'uova, (colored eggs in sweet bread) foretell the coming of Easter. Also, called by the same name, are braided breads baked with whole hard-boiled eggs that have been colored and set into dough. Often there will also be cannoli and sfingi (Italian-style beignet) as well as baccala (fish), frittata (omelets cooked with vegetables) and carduni (stem of the artichoke plants.)

During the week actually preceding the Feast Day, a novena and prayer service is held each evening for 9 days during which the Holy Rosary is recited and often sung in Italian. On the day before the Feast Day, a Mass is offered in thanksgiving and anyone is invited to attend. After the Mass, the Priest blesses the altar and all the food that will be served to those attending the following day.

In her planning, the hostess chooses a designated number of persons to represent different saints, including an honored pair representing Joseph and Mary and a child to represent the child Jesus. On the morning of the Feast Day after the Rosary has been sung, Joseph, Mary and the Child will lead a precession to portray the journey to Bethlehem where they will knock at three doors, the "tupa tupa" ritual of knocking to ask for food and shelter. They will be turned away at the first two and invited in at the third door for food and hospitality. They will take their place at a special table to preside over a festive meal along with other people representing saints that have been chosen to enjoy the meal with the Holy Family. St. Joseph sits at the head facing the altar; alongside him is his staff. The Madonna sits at the right of St. Joseph, and the Infant Jesus on his left is seated on a white satin cushion in the place of honor with the other saints sitting all around. The child portraying the infant Jesus will bless the Altar with Holy Water and a sprig of fresh mint. No one is allowed to eat until these guests have been served a several course meal beginning with a slice of orange and ending with desserts. The courses consist of fried vegetables, fruits, spaghetti, fish, stuffed artichokes (which are a major attraction), bread, wine and desserts. Tradition has it they are to eat a bite of each food item on the altar.

Before the guests leave the table, the hostess will wash the hands and feet of the Holy Family and the chosen representing the saints just as Christ did to the disciples before the Last Supper. Once the Holy Family leaves the table, a spaghetti dinner is served to everyone in attendance, followed with the serving of many cookies, pastries, etc. The food that remains will then be distributed to various charities and those less fortunate. The only item that remains with the host and hostess is the monstrance.

A small glass of wine is offered to each guest as a token of friendship. Any guest may request a portion of the St. Joseph's Bread to be taken home and to be kept in the house all year to protect the occupants from starvation. The bread is also believed capable of diverting storms that are headed towards one's property. A fava bean is also given to each guest to be kept in his or her coin purse reflecting the belief that the lucky bean will keep the owner from going broke.

The faith behind the St. Joseph Table expresses itself in feasting and creating the atmosphere of family and friends. On St. Joseph Day, there are no strangers, only family and friends we haven't yet met. The values of Sicilian life are faith, feasting and family and are the same values behind St. Joseph's Table and the Lord's.

There is much levity and joyful exchanges of camaraderie. The age-old expression is frequently used, "May St. Joseph always smile upon you."



The Ceremony of the Saints

One of the features on the day of the St. Joseph Altar is the re-enactment of the Bethlehem story. Some children and adults are chosen to represent Jesus, Mary and Joseph, favorite saints and angels.

As Joseph sought shelter for Mary by knocking on doors many years ago, the "saints" in a procession fashion knock (tupa-tupa) on three doors. At the first two doors, they are turned away, but at the third door they are extended warm greetings with the following words, "Whatever I have is yours. Come and eat at my table." The "saints" represented are then led to the altar table which is set with beautiful linen, china, silver and crystal. They are then reverently served and the children and visitors remain silent during this contemplative period.

Jesus then opens the ceremony by cutting the bread that is to be eaten by the "saints". St. Joseph is always served first, and the tradition denotes the order in which the courses are presented. With the exception of the pasta, there are always three portions of the same food on each plate, symbolizing the Three Persons in the Blessed Trinity and the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. Orange fruit segments and other fruits begin the feast, followed by bread, pasta with mudica (bread crumbs), seafood, vegetables, cookies, desserts, as well as water and wine. Before the "saints" begin eating each one of the courses, they must listen for the words "Mangiate, santi dolci." (Eat, sweet saints.)

At the close of the ceremony, the saints are given one of the symbolic breads to remind them of their participation. Jesus takes the cross, the rosary goes to Mary, and the staff to Joseph. The altar is then "broken" and all guests are then invited to partake of this special meal.

This Saint Joseph Altar will be Blessed on Saturday, March 21,2015. You are encouraged to kneel and pray for your own intentions.

The Saint Joseph Altar Customs

THE ALTAR

The altar is constructed in three tiers, representing the THREE PERSONS in the Blessed Trinity. A statue of St. Joseph or a picture of the Holy Family is always placed on the top tier of the altar surrounded by flowers, greenery and fruit.

THE BLESSING OF THE ALTAR

A priest blesses all of the items that are placed on the altar—the food, candles, medals, holy cards and fava beans—in a special ceremony the afternoon/evening before the altar is "broken." That evening people may visit to pray and to leave petitions.

THE FRESH GREEN BRANCH

At the place or close to the place where the altar is erected, a fresh green cedar branch is placed over the door and at the road when appropriate. This is indicative of welcoming the public to be involved in the ceremony and to share the food.

THE BREAD OF ST. JOSEPH

A specially prepared bread is blessed and then is distributed at the altar. It may be eaten, but is often times saved. During a storm or inclement weather, a small piece is thrown out and prayers are said in hopes that the storm will pass.

THE MEAL WITHOUT MEAT

There are several speculations as to why meats are never served at a St. Joseph's Altar. First of all, the St. Joseph's Altar occurs during the Lenten season, and this meal also serves as a reminder of the Last Supper. But research reveals that the Sicilian's ancestors ate mostly bread, vegetables, and some fish.

A "BROKEN" ALTAR

The term "broken" in reference to an altar means that the beautiful, decorative food is served to the families and friends gathered at the ceremony.

MINT

The Saint representing Jesus blesses the altar with a sprig of mint doused with holy water and says "I Bless this Altar in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. AMEN."

PANE GROSSO (Big Breads)

Devotional breads are wreath-shaped and each represents the saints. Friends request to have a bread on the altar in a special petition in Thanksgiving to a saint for an intercession or answered prayer. These breads are decorated with cookies, candies, and special fig cookies intricately shaped and sculpted....that are also called cuccidatti.

WASHING OF THE FEET

A ceremony performed by the host and hostess of the altar in which the feet of the people representing the saints are washed and kissed by those who choose to do so. This is an act of humility.

Wine - miracle of Cana: the Blood of Our Savior.

Grapes - vineyards of Sicily

Fig Leaves - represent the fig orchards of Sicily; and the dried figs used to make cuccidatti


The Fava Bean - The gift of a blessed bean is the most well-known of the customs associated with the St. Joseph's Altar. During one of Sicily's severe famines, the fava bean thrived while other crops failed. It was originally grown for animal fodder, but because of its amazing resilience, it became the sustaining food of the farmers and their families. The fava bean also is a taken of the St. Joseph's Altar, and a reminder to pray to St. Joseph.

Burro (donkey) - the transportation of Joseph, Mary and Jesus.

Citrus Fruits (Orange/Lemon) - Abundance of the Earth

Cuccidatti - these breads are decorated with cookies, candies and special fig cookies intricately shaped and sculpted.

Le Vastede - small decorative bread dough are made to adorn (or vest) the altar





Recipes

Italian Bread Crumbs (Mudica) Mary Agnello

Use hamburger buns or stale bread. Grind in food processor until the crumbs are fine.

Then fry in an iron skillet (or you can put in a baking pan) about 4 cups of crumbs in two tablespoons of olive oil. Season crumbs with garlic salt, sugar and pepper and $\frac{1}{4}$ cup of olive oil. Pour over the crumbs and work it in, stir well.

Bake in 400 temperature oven until light brown or fry in an iron skillet.

Green Bean Patty (Sis Sandone)

2 cans Cut Green Beans
½ cups Progresso Italian Bread Crumbs
½ cup grated Parmesan Cheese
1 beaten egg (it may take 2)
2 Green onions cut very fine (1/2 cup)
Salt and Pepper to taste

Mix thoroughly and fry in deep fat, patty style. You can also put in oiled 9' pie pan and bake at 350 until set. Cut into wedges like a quiche.

Cabbage Patties (Sis Sandone)

4 cups Cabbage 1 Egg ½ cup Flour Salt and Pepper to taste Cut up cabbage into large pieces and boil until tender. Cut up the cabbage into small pieces and add the egg, flour, salt, and pepper. Form into patties and roll into the following mixtures:

1 package of hot dog buns (run through the food processor and toasted)

4 cloves of Garlic

½ teaspoon crushed Red Pepper

½ cup grated Romano Cheese

Fry in olive oil until brown

Grandma Ann's Small Fig Cookies Annie Palasota

12 cups all purpose flour4 cups of Crisco1 Tablespoon of Baking Powder

1 cup of Sugar

2 teaspoons Salt

2 ½ cups of water

Cream Crisco and sugar until smooth. Sift the flour, salt and baking powder together and add alternately with the water. This dough should be soft and easy to roll. It has a tendency to get tough the more you work it and add flour. Roll out to about ¼ inch and cut into 3 inch strips. Fill these strips with the fig filling and seal the edges. Cut into 2 inch bars and put slits in the top. Bake at 350 degrees until slightly brown. (64 servings)

Fig Filling:

3 lbs. of figs

1 teaspoon nutmeg

1 cup of chopped pecans

1 package of raisins

1 teaspoon cloves

1 ½ cups sugar

1 whole orange

1 teaspoon allspice

1 small can crushed pineapple

1 teaspoon cinnamon

(optional)

½ cup water (do not add water until after pineapple; it may not need)

Grind figs, raisins, and orange. Add spices, sugar, pecans, and water. (Prepare the night before).

Soft Biscotti

(Rose Lampo – Dallas, cousin – Jobey Ruffino)

5 lbs. Flour

3 cups Sugar

3 ½ cups Crisco

10 Eggs, beaten separately

6 Tablespoons Baking Powder, level

2 cups Milk, heated

2 Tablespoons Vanilla

Mix dry ingredients together, and then add Crisco as in pie dough. Make a hole in center of dry ingredients and add beaten egg yolks, milk, and vanilla. Mix well; let stand. Roll 1 ½ inches long. Bake in oven for about 10 minutes. Do not over bake.

Icing:

2 lbs. of Powder Sugar – enough milk to make soft icing (approximately ¾ cups) 1 stick of Butter 1½ tablespoons Lemon Extract or Vanilla

Stuffed Artichokes

(In memory of Jobey Ruffino)

6 Medium Artichokes

4 cups Bread Crumbs

2 cups Celery - Chopped

1 cup Onion - Chopped

4 tablespoons Garlic - Chopped (optional)

1 cup Parmesan Cheese

1 cup Olive or Butter or other oil

1 cup Water

1 cup Mozzarella Cheese

Salt and Pepper to taste

Cut the pointed ends off artichokes, wash and thump upside down to help spread the leaves so they will be easy to stuff with crumb mixture. Boil the artichokes in water with enough water to cover artichokes for 20 minutes.

Bread Crumb Mixture:

Mix the breadcrumbs with salt and pepper to taste. Sauté' the celery, onions and garlic in oil or butter. Garlic goes in last to keep from burning. Add this to the crumbs. Mix well. Add Parmesan cheese and mix again. Pour ½ cup water into bottom of baking dish and sprinkle the other ½ cup over the stuffed artichokes along with oil or butter. Sprinkle Parmesan cheese, and if desired, grated mozzarella cheese on top after artichokes are finished. Bake at 300 degrees for 2 hours or until the goodie at the bottom of the leaf is tender.

Rings

(In memory of Annie Palasota)

1 cup Crisco 8 cups Flour

3 Eggs

1 teaspoon Vanilla

2 cups Sugar 3 teaspoons Baking Powder

1 cup Milk

Mix together well and then roll and shape into rings. Bake at 350 degrees until light brown.

Icing:

2 lb. box of Powdered Sugar (4 cups) 10 tablespoons Milk

1 teaspoon Vanilla 2 teaspoons Lemon Extract

SCARDALENE

(In Memory of Annie Palasota)

1 / 2 Cup Water

3 Cups Sugar

Cook until it boils twice, than add 3 cups of whatever it takes of flour. Make a well with flour and pour the hot water and sugar mixture into the well. Mix and roll out immediately. Let stand until dry. Then cut into 2 inch pieces and bake in the overn until slightly brown.

SCARDALENE (Lucy Vacante)

- Box White Powder Sugar
- 1 / 2 Cups of all purpose flour
- 1 Tablespoon Crisco
- 1 / 2 Cup Milk
- 1 Teaspoon Vanilla

Mix flour and sugar. Add Crisco, milk, and vanilla. Mix well. Roll in long strips. Cut in $1\frac{1}{2}$ " pieces (cut at a slant). Let dry 3 days. Bake until brown.

CAULIFLOWER FRITTERS

(In Memory of Rosalie Scarmardo)

1	20 oz. Bag Cauliflower	2/3	Cup Water
2	Cups Bisquick Baking Mix	2	Eggs
1 /4	Cup Romano or Parmesan Cheese	Pinch	of Oregano

Cook cauliflower in salted boiling water for 5 minutes, and drain. Ina medium size mixing bowl, put the baking mix, cheese, oregano, and add slightly beaten eggs and water. A dash of black pepper may be added to the batter. Pour 1 /2 cup of oil in a 10-inch skillet and heat. Add the cauliflower to the batter, and drop by tablespoonful into hot grease and brown on both sides.

SFINGE

(In Memory of Lena Degelia)

Cups Flourpackages dried yeastCups Water

Stir together with a spoon and let rise to double in size. Drop by tablespoon into a deep fryer until golden brown. Sprinkle powdered sugar on them and enjoy while hot.

SFINGE

(In Memory of Grace Todaro)

Cups Ricotta Cheese
 Eggs
 Tablespoons Sugar

Cups Flour

3

1 teaspoon Vanilla

Beat Ricotta cheese, eggs, sugar, flour and vanilla in a bowl until creamy. Set in refrigerator for 3 hours. If batter is firm, roll into balls. If not drop by teaspoonfuls into hot oil and deep fry until golden brown. Roll in white powdered sugar.

TAY TU'S CHOCOLATE BALLS

(In Memory of Rosalie Scarmardo)

5	Cups Flour
1	Pinch of salt
1 , ,	Teaspoon Baking Powder
1	Teaspoon Baking Soda
1/2	Cup Sugar
4	Eggs
1	Teaspoon Cinnamon
1 1/4	Cups Crisco
1	16 oz can Hershey Syrup
1	Cup Pecans
1	Teaspoon Cloves

Beat eggs. Add shortening and sugar. Mix dry ingredients together. Add syrup to beaten eggs. Add flour and nuts. Roll into small balls. Bake 8 minutes at 375 degrees. Ice with cookie icing.


